
FICTION: GRADES 6-8

THE MAZE RUNNER by Dashner (YA Dashner)

When Thomas wakes up in the heart of a giant maze, he discovers that he has no memories of his life before the maze - just like the 60 boys already living there. Soon, a girl arrives with the news that from this point on no one new will ever arrive, and the boys realize they must defeat some dangerous enemies and find a way out of the maze before it's too late. THE GRAVEYARD BOOK by Gaiman (JF Gaiman)

The boy Nobody has been raised by gentle ghosts in a graveyard following his escape from his family's murderer. What will happen when the murderer returns for him?

THE INVENTION OF HUGO CABRET by Selznick (JF Selznick)

Orphan, clock winder, AND petty thief, twelve-year-old Hugo lives in the walls of a busy Paris train station in 1931, where his survival depends on anonymity. When he meets a girl and her godfather the toymaker, his most precious secrets are put to the test.

LIFE AS WE KNEW IT by Pfeffer (YA Pfeffer)



UGLIES by Westerfeld (YA Westerfeld)




AL CAPONE DOES MY SHIRTS by Choldenko (YA Choldenko, Summer)

CITY OF EMBER by DuPrau (JF DuPrau)



THE THIEF LORD by Funke (YA Funke, Summer)

Orphans Prosper and Bo run away from their mean aunt to live together in the magical city of Venice.

ARTEMIS FOWL by Colfer (YA Colfer)

When a twelve-year-old evil genius tries to restore his family fortune by capturing a fairy and demanding a ransom in gold, the fairies fight back with magic, technology, and a particularly nasty troll. (Followed by THE ARCTIC INCIDENT, THE ETERNITY CODE, THE OPAL DECEPTION, THE LOST COLONY, THE TIME PARADOX, THE ATLANTIS COMPLEX.)

STARGIRL by Spinelli (YA Spinelli, Summer)

Leo Borlock follows the unspoken rule of conformance at Mica Area High School. Then Stargirl bursts into the tenth grade in an explosion of color and a clatter of ukulele music and shakes up everything. Eventually, the scales of popularity shift and Stargirl is shunned for her differences. Meanwhile, Leo has fallen in love with her.



THE HUNGER GAMES by Collins (YA Collins)



THIRTEEN REASONS WHY by Asher (YA Asher)





Grades 9 & up


One of the most influential rappers of all time allows readers to gain insight into his life and his emotional struggles. The book is as raw and personal as his music.

THE GLASS CASTLE by Walls (YA B Walls) (Grades 9 & up)




